2025: A Year of Anniversaries for Washington

As our nation gears up to celebrate its 250th anniversary next year, the town of Washington also has several significant milestones to recognize.

Few institutions in town are older than The Frederick Gunn School which marks its 175th anniversary in 2025. Founded in 1850 by Washington native and recent Yale graduate Frederick Gunn, the school was ahead of the times, welcoming girls, African Americans, Native Americans and international students. It has long been a cornerstone of the community, with graduates continuing to contribute

meaningfully to the town, most notably Ehrick Rossiter.

Rossiter, a member of the Class of 1871, went on to become a prominent architect. He returned to Washington to design many of Washington's iconic buildings, including

the Gunn Memorial Library, the Devereux Glenholme School, and St. John's Episcopal Church. Rossiter also purchased and donated the land to create the Steep Rock Land Trust, which

celebrates its 100th anniversary this year. What began as a 165-acre preserve has grown into over 6,000 acres of protected land for public enjoyment. Steep Rock not only enhances the town's recreational and natural resources but also offers a range of



educational opportunities that enrich community life.

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for a vibrant community that supports the longevity of our local businesses and other non-profits.

Several other long-standing institutions are also celebrating milestones in 2025. The Institute for American Indian Studies marks its 50th anniversary, The Washington Liquor store celebrates 75 years in business, and Wright Electric turns 50. The longevity of these organizations — and many others reflects the deep-rooted support and enduring resilience of the Washington Community.

Spotlight on Business: Aspetuck Animal Hospital



Aspetuck Animal Hospital has been a part of the Marbledale/New Preston community since it opened its doors 55 years ago in 1970. Dr. Ferris Gorra chose the location to hang a shingle because there were no other clinics nearby and the property was right on the 202 New Milford to Torrington corridor. Back then Dr. Ferris, and up to five other veterinarians at times treated large and small animals serving the many farms in the area. As the years passed, most of the farms left and around 1996 the practice shifted to seeing only small companion animals, mostly cats and dogs. Over the years Dr. Ferris had other veterinarians work with him until his son Dr. Mike finished vet school in 1997 and came back to join the practice and then officially take over in 2005. A few years later his vet school classmate, Dr. Trish Grinnell, joined the practice.

The practice has continued to grow, adding three more doctors in recent years: Dr. Tabi Stillo, Dr. Anne Hermans, and Dr. Dani Szajer. Dr. Mike attributes some of the recent growth to the popularity of COVID puppies, enhanced relationships between humans and animals as well as many previous part-time residents becoming full-time residents of Washington. Each of the doctors at Aspetuck bring different skills to the practice with Dr. Trish and Dr. Tabi both certified in traditional Chinese medicine, including acupuncture and Dr. Anne having a special interest in homeopathy.

Looking ahead, Dr. Mike and Dr. Trish say they want the practice to continue to be a "hometown" one that supports the community and continues the tradition that was started by Dr. Ferris 55 years ago.

The introduction and tribal information for the exhibit are written by Wunneanatsu Lamb-Cason (Schaghticoke/HoChunk), the granddaughter of Trudie Lamb Richmond (Schaghticoke), the first Director of Education and Public Programs for IAIS.



We will also celebrate our 50th anniversary with a gala on August 14 at Hopkins Vineyard. Enjoy hearty hors d'oeuvres, wine, and a performance by the Pilobolus dance troupe.

The FFA (Future Farmers of America) is a youth organization that prepares students for leadership, personal growth, and career success in the field of agricultural education. Typically, members of the organization are future farmers, chemists, veterinarians, entrepreneurs, bankers, international business leaders, teachers, and professionals in many career fields. Parents, Board members, staff, and members of the community will be in attendance to honor students from The Agriscience Academy.





Town Taxes Due July 1 to August 1

Town of Washington personal property taxes are based on ownership as of the Grand List date of **October 1**, **2024** and become payable at the beginning of the fiscal year on **July 1**, **2025**. The last day to pay without interest is **August 1**.

New Tax bills will be mailed on June 26 and posted on the town website on July 1. You cannot pay nor look up your new tax bills online prior to July 1. The tax office will be closed for fiscal year-end on June 27 and 30.

Questions regarding assessments or motor vehicle tax bill issues should be addressed to **the Assessor's Office at 860-868-0398** prior to paying your tax bills.

Payments received or postmarked after August 1 are considered delinquent and will be charged interest from the due date of July 1 at the rate of 1.5% per month or fraction thereof. Interest is charged on all late payments; no exceptions to this policy. (CGS \$\$12-130, 145 & 146).

Failure to receive a tax bill does not relieve a taxpayer of the responsibility to pay taxes or delinquent charges (CGS § 12-130). Past due taxes must be paid in full before payment on current bills can be accepted. If real estate taxes remain unpaid as of March 31, 2026, tax liens will be applied. If motor vehicle taxes remain unpaid as of August 2, 2025, they will be reported to the DMV.

June Is Dog License Month!

Connecticut State Statute §22-338: Each owner or keeper of a dog of the age of six months or older shall cause such dog to be licensed in the town clerk's office in the town where such dog is kept, on or before June 30th, annually, or at such time as such dog becomes six months old, and annually thereafter, on or before June 30.



The 2025/2026 licenses and tags will become available June 1 through June 30 at a fee of \$8.00 for an altered dog and \$19.00 for an unaltered dog. After July 1 there is a \$1.00 late fee per month. A rabies vaccination certificate and spay/neuter certificate (if applicable) are required. Licenses can be issued by mail or in person.
