# **Things are Happening in Washington!**

Major progress has been made on a number of Washington Economic Development projects. The Washington Depot sign is up at the 47 & 202 intersection. Following Tony Bedini's extended negotiations with the Connecticut Department of Transportation, Ghi Signs created and installed a sign highlighting the many attractions of the Depot and the Green. Next on the agenda are gateway signs at the western and eastern entries to the Town and signs at the Main St and Rte 45 entries to the Village of New Preston.

With funding from the Washington Garden Club, a double charging station for electric vehicles will be installed in the Depot. Wright

Electric has graciously offered to install the station at no cost. The Washington charging station will be prominently listed on Plug Share used by electric car owners to map their trips. This is the first of several projects being developed by the Planning Commission Sustainability Committee.

Pursuing the Return to the River initiative, River Park has been refreshed. The fencing has been replaced by the Town Crew and the Shepaug River invasives have been removed by Arbor Tree Services. New picnic tables are being installed to encourage outdoor lunch and dinner from any of the many eateries nearby.



With expertise from the Connecticut Economic Resource Center (CERC), the WEDC is undertaking a major learning project in the support of economic and social development planning for the Town. Starting in mid-July the community, both full and part-time, will be invited to complete an online survey. The survey asks "what do you like about the Town now" and "what changes would make it an even better fit to your interests and lifestyle"? To participate, look for a link on the town website.

Workshop #5, Thurs, July 28, 5:30 – 7:00pm, Washington Town Hall will outline the Washington Economic Development priorities and plans for next year.

New England's construction season is in full swing and there are many projects in progress townwide, both municipal and private. There'll be chip sealing of roads, drainage improvements, and complete reconstruction of several roads with the combined efforts of our highway department and contractors. Aquarian Water Company is working on a major water main replacement for their customers in the Washington Green area. Eversource contractors are performing an aggressive tree trimming program throughout Washington in the hopes of minimizing storm damage and future power outages. This is in conjunction with large and small private projects that'll inevitably lead to anything but a peaceful summer for some. Please be patient when travelling our roads and when encountering any of these crews, they're doing their best to minimize your inconvenience while performing their work in a safe manner.
