Two more road projects have been completed; Slaughterhouse Road and Bell Hill Road were completely rebuilt and the Tinker Hill drainage work is wrapping up. The road crew will be working on pothole repairs and patching over the next weeks ahead of the closing of asphalt plants as well as preparing our equipment for the coming winter snow season.

The water main replacement has been completed on Kirby Road which will be repaved and get new sidewalks in 2017. While work is progressing on the Wykeham Road water main the project is weeks from completion and road closures will continue to be posted on the Town website.

Spotlight on Education: Washington Montessori School

The energy is palpable. 240 toddlers to 8th graders literally descend on the 48-acre Washington Montessori Campus. Every school day morning opens with the high energy produced by the momentary mixing of students, teachers and parents. It might be thought of as a "noisy calm" that pervades the lobby of the Washington Montessori School (WMS) and sets expectations for the day. And just to make sure everyone is primed, the Montessori Café, a mobile coffee cart, offers munchies just inside the front door.



Reintroduced to America in the late fifties, WMS came to New Preston in 1965 with seven students enrolled in a basement school in the St. John's Church. Founded by Elvira Charles and her husband Otis, Pastor of the Church, with the assistance of Helen Parkhurst, WMS has evolved over the last 52 years guided by a deep commitment to the personalization of each child's education.



Using a framework of hands-on learning, the specially trained Montessori teachers foster in each student personal responsibility, persistence in solving problems and the consequence of personal choices. Stepping off from a respect for each child's natural development, the Montessori approach integrates several essential elements — mixed age classrooms, student choice of activity, uninterrupted blocks of work time and learning from working with materials rather than always from direct instruction.

Moving to a new 48-acre campus in 2003, with a current enrollment

of 240, WMS has emerged as a beacon of "learn how to learn" education in northwest Connecticut. In a world increasingly complex and virtually impossible to predict, WMS prepares its students to "expect, be ready for and lead change."

Expectations run high. A noted by-product of the Montessori educational approach is the release of the student's capacity for innovation—Google founders Larry Page and Sergei Brin, Amazon's Jeff Bezos, Jimmy Wales, founder of Wikipedia among the more noteworthy. In today's continuing discussion of "overparenting" ("How to Raise an Adult," Julie Lythcott-Haims), the Montessori philosophy, as practiced for half a century at WMS, offers an at-hand partner in assuring children are properly prepped for the unpredictable world of the future.
