As we head into the winter season there are projects wrapping up all over town. The Highway Department has completed its paving and drainage projects. This year 3.5 miles of road were reclaimed and repaved. The reclamation creates a new, smooth roadbed for the repaving. There have also been extensive drainage improvements on those roads which will extend the life of the road. New sidewalks were constructed along Kirby Road and School Street, replacing walkways that had become hazardous.

While shifting from summer to winter the road crew will be doing patching and tree removal along with prepping our fleet for the winter plowing season.

The Bryan Plaza renovation continues on schedule and while it has been inconvenient our businesses have remained open and our citizens have coped with changing traffic patterns. We expect the project to be ready for Holiday in the Depot December 8.

Spotlight on Business: Dobson Pools 50 Years of Passion

Passion with personal engagement is the Dobson family mantra. It's not just for their pool customers but the community, too. Jim Dobson was born in Stamford, CT to a large family. He started early in property maintenance, including pools. He collects cars and properties and provides ongoing support to the community, particularly those in need.

He started his career with a pool company in Darien, CT but saw an opportunity to build pools in the northwest corner. Opened in 1968, Dobson Pools is celebrating five decades of business. Building 50 pools a year, Dobson provides design, construction and maintenance services.



Three generations... sort of... are engaged in the business. Admittedly the third generation, Colton James, is only two years old. The proverbial three-legged stool defines the Dobson Pools business model. Jim is the driver, always with an eye on the money. Brian is the hands-on chief of operations. Julie, with a bit of help from Liberty, the office greeter dog, is administrative officer. Over the years, the team has set the standard for pools in the northwest corner. Just as Jim Dobson had expected when he opened the company in 1968.

Pools are life changers. For many, they are less about prestige and more about creating joy for the owner and their families. Dobson's personal approach seeks to understand "Why the owner wants a pool? How will it change their lives?" For Dobson, design is driven by a personal, hands-on commitment. And none are constructed without onsite engagement by one of the Dobson team. It's personal for them.

That personal engagement finds a place in the community as well. Jim's family says he has "a really soft, sometimes bleeding heart." With a particular sensitivity to the underdog, veterans and the less fortunate, Jim Dobson shares his accumulated success on an as-needed basis. He says, "It just feels good."

A passion for personal engagement, marked success in delivering life changing experiences for its clients and a sensitivity to primary community needs, Jim Dobson and Dobson Pools have added much to Washington and the northwest corner over the last 50 years.

TV Production & Broadcasting Students Featured on FOX 61

Washington, CT – November 14, 2017 - Washington town residents shouldn't be surprised to see Ms. Pitt's TV Production & Broadcasting students around town reporting on events and stories of local interest. The class, new at Shepaug this year, provides hands-on learning in the field of broadcast journalism. Students learn the art of finding and developing good topics and combining video footage, interviews and effective storytelling to create news packages.

In order to provide an authentic audience for their pieces, Ms. Pitt enrolled the class in the FOX 61 Student News program. According to their website, "The FOX 61 Student News program empowers Connecticut middle and high school students to explore the world of multi-media journalism by giving them the opportunity to capture, edit and publish original content under the guidance of industry professionals."

Shepaug students have been the first news packages featured on the state wide broadcast this season. The first to air was Kayla Amorosa and Mallory Noone's feature on New Milford's Oktoberfest, and the second was Katherine Denyko and Michael Iannazzo's piece about Harrybrooke Park's Haunted Trail.



Each video is produced by the students and is about a story local to the community and focused around the station's mission of "Hope." The news packages air during the FOX 61 morning news broadcasts at 6:20 and 8:20am, and in the evening broadcasts at 5:00 and 10:00pm. They're also featured on the station's website and Facebook page.

With such a positive start to the program, we expect to see many more Shepaug news segments in the future!

Chris Herren to Speak at Shepaug

In an effort to raise awareness of drug and alcohol abuse throughout the school community, the Prevention Council of Bridgewater, Roxbury and Washington will welcome former NBA star and motivational speaker Chris Herren to Shepaug Valley School on January 16, 2018. Herren will share his story with the student body at Shepaug that morning. The school presentation will be followed up with another presentation that night at Shepaug, starting at 7:00pm, for the entire community.

Chris will share his story of going from a basketball star in Fall River to an NBA player to a patient in a rehab facility, all while struggling with addiction for over fourteen years. Chris Herren's Project Purple is designed to break the stigma of addiction, bring awareness of the dangers of substance abuse, and educate and encourage youth to maintain a healthy, substance-free lifestyle. The initiative uses positive messaging like "I am enough," "I am a warrior," and "I am strong" to support students as they navigate difficult decisions.
