Spotlight on Business: **Eliot Johnson, West Mountain Builders**

Three generations of Johnson passion have created a multi-era tradition in Washington. Eliot Johnson is a third generation Washingtonian, a farmer paying homage to the town's agrarian traditions and a contributor to Washington's commercial success. Eliot operates a 40-acre beef and hay farm on West Mountain Road while also running a family business, West Mountain Builders. He has grown a family in town while propelling West Mountain Builders into a well-known and highly regarded custom home builder.



In 1940, Walter Johnson, Eliot's grandfather, acquired 90 acres on West Mountain Road and established a dairy farm. In 1976, Walter Johnson III, Eliot's father, with only a modest interest in dairy farming, opened a renovation business. Eliot

enthusiastically took over in 2002 and renamed the business West Mountain Builders after the road the family had lived on since the founding of the original farm. A graduate of Canterbury School (New Milford) and Marist College (Poughkeepsie, New York), Eliot has continued both Johnson traditions: family farming and fine New England craftsmanship with West Mountain Builders – thus bridging two eras of Washington commercial endeavor.

West Mountain Builders' passion has created "word of mouth" among the high-end architects of the Northwest Corner and NYC. With a seasoned staff, including Eliot's wife Stephanie, West Mountain Builders brings personalized service and attention to detail to the construction of large scale but intimate homes in Litchfield County.

Eliot and Stephanie have extended this passion into the community. They have deep involvements with the Washington Art Association – both are on the Board, the Steep Rock Association, local schools and the Boy Scouts. Continuing the Johnson's commitment to Washington, the family recently opened their farm to the public with a transfer of 50 acres to the Steep Rock Association.

Assessor's Office

The October 1 assessment date in Connecticut is the 'effective' date for many tax benefit applications or statutorily required filings with the Assessor's Office.

Military veterans seeking exemptions for Honorable service on the 2019 grand list and in future years, must file their Form DD-214 service record with the Town Clerk by the prior September 30 – if they haven't previously done so. Veterans may also apply for a two-year increased exemption based upon income; if they file an application with income proofs by October 1.

Real estate owners may submit new or amended applications for a special tax value for acres already in productive agricultural use on Oct. 1, between Sept. 1 – Oct. 31, 2019.

Any organization already enjoying tax-exempt status must also file a supplemental application for exempt status for any additional property acquired after the prior (2017) quadrennial filing on or before November 1, 2019.

Additionally, owners of business personal property are required to file declarations of assets held on the assessment date, U.S. postmarked no later than Nov. 1, 2019.

Rock, Paper, Scissors

This Exhibition features two artists that at first glance appear as polar opposites. Brad Greenwood is a painter and Sam Funk is a sculptor. The light, hovering ephemerality and transient imagery of Greenwood is juxtaposed with the gravity of carved stone. However, in this show the stone reveals an urge to fly while the paintings convert the unendurable lightness of being in our contemporary culture into a playful parade of ever changing images.



Greenwood describes his paintings as scenes in a play with actors coming on and off the stage, drawing upon his personal story but also fed by his deep fondness of art history.

While each character is his own, his figures often mingle with iconic likenesses from paintings by classic painters and modern masters like Alice Neel, David Hockney, Roy Lichtenstein and others. His work utilizes figuration, abstraction, myth, and reality in equal parts and in new ways, creating narratives of personal emotion complicated by a deep and energizing love of paint and the history of art.



Sam Funk's sculptures make the impossibly heavy take flight. Funk says of his work, "transforming stone into an object of flight is antithetical to all we

know, yet there is a world out there, in our universe, where stone flies." Sam Funk, whose background had been in creative writing as well as script writing for television, putting word to paper had often been a frantic process toward fluid dialogue. Having strayed more recently toward the visual arts and stone carving, this sort of distillation is still paramount. His chosen narratives about the airborne and the grounded in conflict, are rendered in the gravity bound material, stone. This intended folly and the artists various poses of form that resemble paper airplanes give his sculptures an elegant figurative quality. Some even try to metamorphose into feathered birds of flight only to be grounded by their material make-up. The results are all at once highly crafted, humorous and poignant.

Washington's Air Quality Monitor Is Up and Running

The Western Connecticut Clean Air Action (WCCAA) group was formed in July 2018 as a multi-town alliance of concerned members of Conservation Commissions, environmental organizations, schools and land trust. It was formed in response to the development of the Cricket Valley gas-fired power plant located in Dover Plains, New York, 5 miles to the west of Kent and 12 miles from Lake Waramaug. The plant is scheduled to go online at the end of the year and its three, 282 feet high smokestacks will emit over $3\frac{1}{2}$ metric tons of air pollutants each year.

The mission of WCCAA is to gather baseline air quality data for our region before Cricket Valley goes online. We'll continue the monitoring thereafter to scientifically assess Cricket Valley's impact on air quality in our region. To that end, the towns of Sharon, Cornwall, Kent, Warren, Washington, New Milford, and Sherman have purchased Aeroqual AQY1 monitors to collect the data. These towns form a north to south arc to the east of Dover Plains which will enable us to measure the pollutants that prevailing winds will be bringing to our communities. The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection has been very supportive and will be of assistance in reading the data. We'll keep you informed when Cricket Valley is up and running.

We're grateful to the participating town governments of Washington, Sharon, Cornwall, Warren, Kent, Sherman, and New Milford. And special thanks to the Kent School, Canterbury School, High Watch Recovery Center, Lake Waramaug Task Force, Lake Waramaug Association, and the Warren Land Trust for sharing in the cost of the monitors. And to the Marvelwood School, the Housatonic River Commission, the Housatonic Valley Association, the Kent Land Trust and the Weantinoge Heritage Land Trust and to individual donors for additional financial support.

We're fortunate to live in such a proactive and supportive community.
