Shepaug Agriscience Academy — A New Educational-Learning Model

The Shepaug Agriscience Academy, long discussed in the Region 12 towns, opened in September and is enjoying a very strong first year. Over-subscribed in its first year, the Academy is already evidencing strong student applications for Year 2. The anticipated Year 4 full enrollment of 139 students appears very likely.

The 41 freshman and five sophmores enrolled have conveyed their enthusiasm for the Academy with their frequent stories about their developing relationships with the animals - sheep, alpaca, recently birthed lambs and an invasives consuming turtle. Horses and chickens are on their way.

The Agriscience curriculum introduces a new educational learning model to Region 12. Think of it as Education through Application where "hands-on" is a core component of Shepaug Agriscience learning. The learning experience starts with introduction in Year 1 to each of four Agriscience pathways. The student chooses a pathway as their major in Year 2.

In a future world, challenged by a growing population - + 2 billion people by 2050, feeding that growth while the climate is changing - the integration of the four pathways helps define major career opportunities for the Agriscience students. Megan Bennett, Region 12 Superintendent comments, "The curriculum ties the pathways together to provide a synergistic educational experience." The Shepaug Valley School's four Agriscience Pathways: Plant Science, Food Production and Processing, Animal Science, and Power, Structural and Technical Systems offers specific courses of study. The courses are aligned with the CT Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources (AFNR) Career Framework.

At Shepaug, each student participates in an Agriscience exploratory course in each pathway. The Year 1 exploratory courses devote nine weeks of instruction to each pathway. Through the course, students learn the foundational concepts and skills associated with each pathway, experience project-based learning opportunities, and explore associated careers, so they may select their preferred pathway for their 9–12 high school studies. Each year, students participate in FFA and the SAE (Supervised Agricultural Experience).

Seventeen of the 46 students are from Region 12 towns clearly demonstrating the potential of the Academy to bring young families to Bridgewater, Roxbury and Washington. With its hands-on educational approach, blended with a heavy concentration in STEM, the Academy promises a next-generation state-ofthe-art education to Region 12.

Spotlight on Business: Stonewalls by George!

Stone has been the medium of choice for creative artists since the beginning of time. And stone defines the rural culture of New England. Jorge (George) Criollo has married the art of stone with the architectural values of Northwest Connecticut to establish a remarkable and

well known business – Stonewalls by George! "Stone is alive." With that thought at the core of his services, Jorge has evolved his business to include Clearing, Excavating, Landscape Design and Residential Construction.



Born in Colombia, Jorge discovered stone as a young child on his grandmother's farm. His adventuresome spirit took him to the Caribbean initially as a merchant marine and then to restaurants on cruise ships. Learning English and demonstrating leadership he quickly advanced, developing a following among the guests, many returning year after year to be attended to by Jorge.

In the late 80s, he was enticed by a couple from Newtown – Wendy and Richard Margules – to move to the Danbury area. With his background in food, he found employment at an upmarket Danbury restaurant – LaFortuna – as maitre d'. With encouragement from local businessmen, in 1992, Jorge ventured into the design and construction of stone walls. In 1994, he incorporated Stonewalls by George. Having met Hilary Hopkins in 1989, they married and moved to New Preston in 1994 to be near her parents and the vineyard.

Design comes naturally to Jorge. He views every project as requiring the selection of stones with the color and grain that "tells a story" and enhances the intentions of the owner of the property. Finding the right stone often requires trips to Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont. And when completed, the stone appears as if it has been there forever, delivering a true work of art and yet another demonstration of the creative gift of Stonewalls by George.

A monoprint is one unique image involving the transfer of ink onto a substrate or piece of paper by manually rubbing or by running it through a printing press. "Monoprint 2020 – Printers and Presses" features artists, printers and professional pressers who have explored the monoprint process in both simple and complex forms.

Sub-categories of monoprint include monotype, trace monotype, ghost images and

"unique" prints, but what has made this process so intriguing to artists of all periods are its accidents and the endless possibilities for experimentation. New technologies and hybrid techniques continue to expand the monoprint into a fascinating realm where one can't resist the opportunity to explore and "play."As preeminent master printer

Ken Tyler has noted that from the earliest handprint on the wall of a cave to the imprint of a baby's footprint recorded at birth, printing remains a basic, instinctual form of self-identity, self-expression and a profound documentation of human existence through time.
