### **Transfer Station Makeover**

As most of us know, the Washington Transfer Station has needed repairs for many years. Through the efforts of our Public Works Department we have recently completed these much-needed improvements. Residents will notice new compactors for recycling and solid waste as well as a new traffic pattern and many new recycling options.

We have a new container for glass recycling. Residents who bring their recycling to the Transfer Station are asked to separate glass from other recycling materials. We have installed a textile bin, a mattress container and a food scrap drop off station (composting). All of these are dedicated recycling initiatives. Please see our Transfer Station attendants for more information on these new programs. New to the Transfer Station this year is a "Swap Shop" building. Items are put in this area at the discretion of our attendants.

As always, the Transfer Station continues to accept tires, batteries, e-waste, demolition materials, metals, appliances, batteries and propane cylinders. We encourage residents to view the Transfer Station fees for these items on the Town



website at washingtonct.org.

While we will continue to make adjustments in an effort to improve the operations at the Transfer Station, we ask that all residents be patient and follow the direction of our attendants. The staff is there to help residents understand the new procedures, protocols and traffic pattern. This newly renovated facility will be safer and more efficient for our residents and employees and we expect it to serve the community for many years to come.

### Message from the Selectmen's Office

As of this writing, we've had a relatively calm winter and look forward to welcoming spring. This spring will see the completion of many of our road and infrastructure projects and the beginning of others. Our Public Works Department has completed the rebuilding of Mygatt Rd. and the makeover at our Transfer Station. Once again, we anticipate a busy season with many of our community organizations ramping up for the better weather ahead. As always, we encourage residents to frequently check the Town website at Washingtonct.org as well as ExploreWashingtonCT.com for all the latest updates.

One of the larger projects to take place this year will be the replacement of the Tunnel Road bridge at the Steep Rock preserve. We ask residents to be patient as this will be a roughly eight-month project from start to finish. Beginning in April, Tunnel Road from River Road will be closed to all traffic both vehicular and pedestrian. All equestrian access and SR1 and SR2 campsites will be closed for 2023. Access to the Steep Rock preserve will be from Spring Hill Rd. off of Roxbury Rd. (Rte 199). Please check the Steep Rock website often for updates. https://steeprockassoc.org/

### Spotlight on Business: Wright Electrical Company

From its humble roots as rural farm country, Washington has changed a lot since Darryl Wright grew up here learning his father's trade. Harry Wright started his electrical business in 1971, taking care of a handful of active dairy farms with Darryl by his side when he was old enough, eventually taking over the business.



Wright Electrical Company has since grown to 20 employees including two of Wright's three sons and handles everything from generators and communications to residential and commercial jobs with the majority of business in the region.

Wright attributes his success to adopting his father's philosophy: "I'm on the job, just like my sons and employees. Nothing is above me and I instill that in my sons. You show your employees and customers that you're not afraid to pick up a shovel and dig a hole."

In addition to running a successful local business, Wright makes sure he sets an example by giving back to his community, hoping to encourage younger residents to get involved. He's been on the fire department for 17 years, serving four years as chief. He's President of the Swanson Family Foundation, board member of Judy Black Memorial Park and Gardens, and member of the Washington Housing Commission. He frequently heads local fundraisers for charity.

"I try to instill volunteerism and local pride because it's important for a small town like Washington," Wright said.

Even when he's relaxing, he likes to stay close to his roots and often walks through town with his wife Donna, art coordinator for Shepaug Valley School.

"It's such a good community," he said. "Everybody waves. There is nothing better."

### **Town of Washington Tax Benefit Programs**

Washington homeowners who were 65 years or older by December 31, 2022, or who are receiving Social Security disability payments may be eligible for a State tax credit on their property tax bill. Their property must be their principal residence and their total income including Social Security, cannot exceed:

### State Income Limits - Single \$40,300 or Married \$49,100

In addition to the above credit from the State, residents may be eligible for a Town tax credit. Applicants must be 65 years or older by December 31, 2022 and must have been taxpayers of the town for a period of (3) three years prior to their application. For the town credit, total income including Social Security, cannot exceed:

### Town Income Limits - Single \$40,700 or Married \$49,500

Application must be filed in the Assessor's office by May 15 and, if eligible, will apply to the July billing. Once approved, for the State benefit program, re-application is every two years unless there is a change in income. Forms will be mailed to State program homeowners who must reapply this year.

Persons currently receiving a Veteran's exemption may be eligible for an additional income-based exemption (see State limits). There is no age requirement for this exemption. Apply between February 1st to October 1st for tax benefit on the October 1, 2023 Grand List.

### **Tax Collector's Office**

### **Delinquent Tax Information and Statutes**

Tax bills remain due and payable for 15 years from the due date – CGS 12-164. As soon as a tax becomes delinquent, it shall be subject to interest at 1.5% for each month, or fraction thereof, from the due date of the tax until the tax is paid in full – CGS 12-145. A tax collector does not have the authority to waive interest on a delinquent tax – CGS 12-146. Collection enforcements include: DMV registration holds, garnishment of wages, bank executions, collection agency, state marshal, tax liens and tax sales.

Motor Vehicle taxes unpaid as of February 2, 2023 were reported to DMV. State law requires DMV to deny vehicle registration in the name of a person reported as tax delinquent. All taxes must be paid on all vehicles before the tax collector can release the compliance issue with DMV – CGS 14-33. If payment is made in cash, clearance may be done immediately. Clearance for payments made online take 3 business days, and clearance for check payments take 10 days.

Real estate tax liens are applied to any unpaid real estate tax as of March 31, 2023. At least 15 days prior to the filing of these liens, a "Notice of Intent to Lien" is sent to each delinquent taxpayer. All tax, interest, and \$24 lien fee must be paid in full before the lien can be released – CGS 12-173-175.

Failure to receive a tax bill does not exempt the taxpayer from payment of all taxes, interest, and fees – CGS 12-130. Interest is charged on all late payments. Any past due taxes, interest, and fees must be paid in full before payment on current bills can be accepted.

All tax information is available on **washingtonct.org**. You can print tax bills, payment receipts and IRS records; research 3 years of tax records; and pay online.

## What's New at the Senior Center?

In recent years, hundreds of trees have been lost at the State Park and around the lake due to age and disease. A lot of trees were planted around the lake between 70 and 100 years ago and they have run their natural course.

Heartfelt thanks to all – but especially to Wamogo Regional High School and its staff, which gave the show a post-pandemic home.

This year's stellar success has led our PBS affiliates around the country to renew and expand their commitments to *Common Ground*, which will take a short hiatus and resume shooting over the summer. Our new base will be the state-of-the-art Tisch Family Auditorium in the Frederick Gunn School's magnificent Thomas S. Perakos Arts and Community Center.

Conversations On the Green looks forward to partnering with the school, its faculty and its students, who will gain myriad opportunities to participate in producing, shooting and distributing digital programming as well as the national series. Did you know?

- 10 seconds of idling your car uses the same amount of fuel as re-starting your engine.
- Idling your vehicle for just 10 minutes can use as much fuel as traveling 5 miles.
- Pollutants and toxic gases from tailpipe emissions exacerbate asthma and other respiratory diseases, especially in children.



Laws exist in Connecticut that prohibit idling for more than 3 minutes (except in traffic or extreme temperatures).

However, more options to curtail the effects of tailpipe emissions are available to all of us.

These environmental concerns are some of the issues behind the NO IDLING campaign to be launched this March by our town, the Sustainability Committee, and the Washington Environmental Council. We have good company with this campaign with towns throughout New England and beyond. The train station in Dedham, Massachusetts posts signs reminding commuters to shut off their engines as they wait for their train or pick up a traveler. Wilton, Connecticut's no idling campaign is in full swing, posting reminder signs throughout their town and on their website: **wiltongogreen.org**.

### The Breakdown of Washington Montessori School's Composting Program

We're thrilled to announce the long-awaited revival of Washington Montessori School's composting operation. Our original program was introduced in the spring of 2012 with the classic "three bin" system as our mode of operation. The bins were built by our Middle School students, and the design was based on the model used at the Mansfield Middle School in Mansfield, CT. Since its inception in 2000, the MMS composting facility has been used as an example by the State of Connecticut DEEP to educate the

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public on larger scale composting strategies for schools and other public facilities.

For seven years, the crate-type structures served us well, but as the bear population in Northwest Connecticut began to expand, so did the potential of our compost becoming the target of maraudings by these opportunistic mammals. The compost operation was shut down in the spring of 2019, and we were forced to go back to the drawing board. As luck may have it, a visit to my gardening class by Denise Arturi, director of Steep Rock's Judea Garden, helped us with this conundrum. Judea, too, had been experiencing bear problems related to their compost pile, and they had recently acquired a Jora Composting Tumbler that seemed to be working out quite well. We purchased two of them in the winter of 2020, but when Covid descended upon us the composting program was put on the back burner.

Two and a half years later, the Green Team and I are super-excited to report that we have reestablished this vital practice. Every day, right after lunch, a dedicated team of Middle School and Elementary students traverse the hallways, with galvanized pails in hand, to collect the food scraps from each classroom. Once they have made their

full rounds, they head downstairs to the compost tumblers and deposit their day's take. This simple process adds up to a desirable and efficient equation: minimal investment of time = extensive and long-lasting impact!

Our composting program is a perfect example of a student-led initiative that directly benefits our school, local community, and beyond. It's a pleasure to work with such a devoted and united team, and together we look forward to continuing our mission of forging a bona fide standard of sustainability!

### **The Housing Commission**

Across the U.S.A. there is an affordable housing crisis and we in our beautiful town of Washington are in the same situation. Housing is affordable when a person or family is paying no more than 30% of their household income for total housing costs. We Washington residents moved to Washington because we love its rural nature, its cultural offerings, its many wonderful schools, and the people who make this town what it is, full-time residents and part-time residents. But... living in Washington is very difficult for many people. Daughters and sons of longtime residents cannot afford to return to Washington. Empty nesters and seniors who would love to downsize cannot find suitable housing. Our essential workers, nurses, teachers, construction workers, volunteer firemen and women and EMTs are financially challenged living in Washington. In order to have a vibrant town we need and want these people in our town.

The Housing Commission is working on developing a small property that was donated to the Washington Community Housing Trust but we need more land that could be properly and handsomely developed into affordable housing. Preserving land for conservation is not mutually exclusive of affordable housing. A recent conference put on by the Connecticut Land Conservation Council was attended by a Housing Commission member, a Steep Rock employee and the Washington Director of Economic Development. We learned that we can continue to conserve land for recreation, farming, and wildlife diversity and also conserve land for affordable housing.

Land donations in the past have provided wonderful places for all of us to enjoy the natural landscape. Land donations in the past have also provided for elderly housing. Do you or someone you know have land that could be donated for affordable housing and conservation? We hope in the future the residents of Washington will think carefully about the need for land for more affordable housing. Our community health depends on this.
