Can We Afford Not to Have Affordable Housing?

Our picturesque town of Washington has been celebrated for its beautiful scenery, preserved land offering a multitude of outdoor activities, its cultural and artistic opportunities, its historic charm and its tight-knit community spirit. But we aren't immune to the housing issues affecting communities in our state and in fact, nationwide. This town celebrated for its historical character and beauty is faced with the task of preserving the

best of what it is amidst the challenges of evolving housing needs.

The rising cost of homes has become a pressing concern. Affordable housing has been a topic of discussion in many of Washington's commission meetings from Housing, Zoning, Economic Development and Sustainability. Why? Because the high price of housing in our town affects everyone. Business owners are having trouble finding employees. Volunteers on the Washington Volunteer Fire Department and the Washington Ambulance have a hard time finding a place to live near where they volunteer. Seniors who wish to downsize cannot find suitable affordable homes.

Young families and middle-income workers are housing challenged. The lack of young



people is obvious in our schools, our volunteer organizations and our businesses. 37% of our residents are over the age of 60 and that percentage is growing.

Housing prices have soared recently. From March 2019 to March 2023, the average price of a house skyrocketed from \$730,000 to \$1,736,000. At this rate, the town will become a stagnant gated community, losing the vibrancy that a diverse population contributes to all our lives.

As our community navigates this intricate issue, understanding the concept of affordable housing within the context of Washington is crucial. So, what is affordable housing? It's housing including mortgage or rent, utilities, taxes and insurance that does not cost a family more than 30% of their income. Also, the household must make 80% or less of the Area Median Income of Litchfield County which was \$84,978 in 2021.

The Town of Washington by a Town Meeting approved the Housing Plan for 2022-2027 with the goal of creating 30 more affordable housing units by 2027. Since then, the Housing Commission has been working with the Washington Community Housing Trust and the Zoning Commission to create more affordable and

middle-income housing for Washington.

We all have the opportunity to shape the future of Washington. What can you do? Keep yourself informed by reading the Affordable Housing Plan and keeping up to date with the work the Housing Commission and the Zoning Commission are doing to meet these challenges. Share your ideas for making affordable housing a reality. In the past, some very generous donors have donated land or money to fund the affordable homes we do have. As Washington, CT stands at the intersection of tradition and change, it has the opportunity to define itself with resilience, adaptability and collective dedication to ensuring that it remains a vibrant, inclusive community.

Message from the Selectmen's Office

The spring season means different things to different people. In our community, spring is a time to say goodbye to winter and look forward to all the new year has to offer. 2024 promises to be an exciting year for Washington. Our business community and civic organizations are busy planning another year of exciting events to keep citizens engaged in all things Washington.

Spring is also the time for Town leaders to create the next fiscal year's budget. There are many factors that determine the annual budget, and by extension, the taxes we all pay each year. Please follow the Town website for the most up-to-date information, attend Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance meetings, ask questions and perhaps above all, attend the annual Town budget hearing and budget vote held in May each year.

The Sustainability Committee

As you know, road salt application helps keep our roads safe in winter. But the sodium chloride from it leaches through our soils into our surface waters and private wells, and it's important to keep this to a minimum, as it can harm our waters and our health. Excessive salt intake aggravates chronic congestive heart failure and raises blood pressure. Drinking water may contain 10% of a person's total sodium intake. For persons on a restricted salt diet, drinking water may contain as much as 64% of their total sodium intake. Elevated levels of salt in surface water increase heavy metal contamination and are toxic to fish and other aquatic life. One teaspoon of salt contaminates five gallons of water.

Some towns in our area have programs in place to monitor the levels of sodium in streams and wells, and the Sustainability Committee is researching how it might implement such a monitoring program, which would start with regular testing of these waters for sodium. We've received proposals for bulk, discounted private well testing, and have learned of methods for testing our tributaries on a regular basis. At our next meeting on February 14, we'll discuss these methods and determine which ones will help us keep our streams healthy. The committee will update the progress with these salt monitoring efforts in future issues of the newsletter.

TOWN OF WASHINGTON Property Tax Benefit Programs

Washington homeowners who were sixty-five or older by December 31, 2023 or who receive Social Security or disability payments, may be eligible for property tax credit for the 2023 Grand List. The property must be their principal residence and total household income including Social Security cannot exceed 2023 state income limits of \$43,800 Single or \$53,400 Married.

Additionally, residents may be eligible for a local Town tax credit. Eligibility requirements are those listed above and applicants must have been taxpayers of the town for three (3) years prior to their application.

Applications must be filed in the Assessor's office February 1 - May 15, 2024. If eligible, tax credit will apply to the July 2024 billing.

Finally, Washington residents currently receiving a veteran's exemption may be eligible for an additional exemption if they meet the above state income limits. There's no age requirement for an additional veteran's exemption. Applications are accepted from February 1 to October 1, 2024 for exemption on the future October 1, 2024 and 2025 Grand Lists.
